



## The Corner Office:

A word from Bob Dwyer, Jr.

Ok, it's January. You have been locked in the house for a few months now. The air is getting a little stale. You're noticing more dust so you're thinking about going out and getting a better air filter from the store; maybe one of those allergy filters for \$15.00 or \$30.00 ... that should help. Stop! Don't do it! There are just a few things you should consider first. Those fancy filters are often the cause of furnace breakdown ... sometimes they damage heat exchangers and breach the safety of a furnace. What happens is these filters often slow down or restrict the air flow in your air ducts; this changes the systems static pressure. The systems static pressure is like your blood pressure; if it's too high you can have big problems ... it can also change the system's delta t this is like your temperature; if it's too high all sorts of bad things can happen. My service technicians find more furnaces not operating correctly and in need of service because of incorrect filters than just about anything else. If you don't know what your system's operating static pressure is do not use those expensive filters. If you think you have too much dust in the house or office or if you have allergies and breathing problems that filter is most likely not the answer. One of my passions is indoor air quality. I want everyone to have a safe and healthy home. Please know you have a friend willing to listen to your concerns. You're welcome to stop by the office, drop me a letter or make a call. I'm willing to listen and offer a little free advice. Yes, I said free advice ... no charge ... the truth is I just love to gab.



Homemade Lasagna

**Ingredients:** 

4



pound sweet Italian sausage
 4 pound lean ground beef
 2 cup minced onion
 cloves garlic, crushed
 (28 ounce) can crushed tomatoes
 (6 ounce) cans tomato paste
 (6.5 ounce) cans canned tomato sauce
 cup water
 tablespoons white sugar
 1/2 teaspoons dried basil leaves
 taspoon fennel seeds

teaspoon Italian seasoning
 tablespoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
 lasagna noodles
 ounces ricotta cheese
 egg
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 3/4 pound mozzarella cheese, sliced
 3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

In a Dutch oven, cook sausage, ground beef, onion, and garlic over medium heat until well browned. Stir in crushed tomatoes, tomato paste, tomato sauce, and water. Season with sugar, basil, fennel seeds, Italian seasoning, 1 tablespoon salt, pepper, and 2 tablespoons parsley. Simmer, covered, for about 1 1/2 hours, stirring occasionally. Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Cook lasagna noodles in boiling water for 8 to 10 minutes. Drain noodles, and rinse with cold water. In a mixing bowl, combine ricotta cheese with egg, remaining parsley, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).

To assemble, spread 1 1/2 cups of meat sauce in the bottom of a 9x13 inch baking dish. Arrange 4 noodles lengthwise over meat sauce. Spread with one half of the ricotta cheese mixture. Top with a third of mozzarella cheese slices. Spoon 1 1/2 cups meat sauce over mozzarella, and sprinkle with 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese. Repeat layers, and top with remaining mozzarella and Parmesan cheese. Cover with foil: to prevent sticking, either spray foil with cooking spray, or make sure the foil does not touch the cheese. Bake in preheated oven for 25 minutes. Remove foil, and bake an additional 25 minutes. Cool for 15 minutes before serving.
