possessions found their way to the countryside ... leaving the big, windy city behind.


I had loved the clamor of the city. Opportunity was everywhere! People to see, places to go, things to do ... the list was endless! Each new day would dawn with a sense of adventure

If you are not a churchgoer at present, I imagine it would take some real willpower to change your current Sunday morning routine. It would also take some bravery to walk through the door of a church building and just look around at the life inside. But if you were brave enough to step through the door of, say, Middlebury Church of the Brethren just a little before 9:00 a.m., what would you find there?

Well, for starters, a warm welcome. Someone might even open the front door for you. If not, there is always a cheerful person stationed to the left of the main entrance who will greet you, help you get oriented to the building ("Where's the bathroom in this place, anyway?") and point you toward our sanctuary.

Upon entering the sanctuary (fancy name for big meeting room), additional greeters will shake your hand and smile like they mean it, because they do. Then an usher will give you a worship bulletin (a small program which gives the starting lineup and tells what inning we're in). These friendly men and women will also help you find a seat if you'd like help, but there are usually plenty of open options. Notice: There are no reserved pews, so you won't ever be sitting in someone else's place. (But should anyone look at you that way, just tell me and I will deal with them personally after the service!)

Worship itself is an interesting mix of traditional and contemporary styles. We sing hymns and use a worship band. We have open mike to share our joys and sorrows. We take children seriously and have special moments just for them (though we have a staffed nursery as well). Sometimes new converts are baptized in our baptistery up front, and all their friends and family gather 'round close enough to dip their hands in the water. Most often there is a sermon, which varies in popularity depending on the topic, but which always comes from considerable Bible study, prayer and thinking on the issues of our day.

Bring on the BBQ!



Blue skies, apple pies and seasoned fries. Bring on the BBQ! Is there any better time in the world than Summer to put on your imaginary "I am a world renown Chef" hat and go to town on every slab of meat you can possibly get your hands on to hone your skills?

I've known some people to spend a good portion of their winters trying to "perfect" their sauce. Personally, I like to play around with the OTC stuff. There is one brand in particular that (I think) offers such a wonderfully aromatic base to experi-

ment with that I don't see the point in trying to get too fancy (or messy) in the kitchen. However, having said that, let me say this ... I will be more than happy to take a front row seat anywhere to gaze upon anyone intently bent over pots, pans, concoctions, spices, etc. trying to create a sauce that is so untouchable and so universally desirable that it will never be duplicated. Witnessing object creativity in its truest form is something in and of itself to be privy to. Coming from a place where food is a major draw, I miss wit-

nessing the constant food competitions, the camaraderie amongst the participants, the pleasantries exchanged and last, but not least, the vigor and devotion to the task of winning. From our Kitchen Burger Bar

Step 1

Preheat outdoor barbecue to medium hot. Take a few paper towels and fold them several times to make a thick square, blot some oil on it, and carefully and quickly wipe the grates to make a non-stick surface. Season 2 pounds of brisket (ground twice) in a bowl with some salt and pepper. Give it about 3 turns in the bowl with your hands or a big spoon.

Step 2

Shape ground beef into 8 patties.

Step 3

Once the grill is hot, put the patties on and cook, around 7 minutes per side for rare burgers, and 8 minutes per side for medium burgers.

Step 4

During the final minute of cooking, throw a slice of Swiss cheese on desired burgers.

Step 5

Toast the buns cut side down for about 1 minute, just to mark them. Prepare toppings, as desired.

Tomatoes with Sea Salt and Chives: Thickly slice 2 pounds heirloom tomatoes, drizzle with olive oil, and sprinkle with sea salt and 1 bunch chopped fresh chives.

Bacon with Rosemary: Lay out 1 pound sliced bacon on a baking sheet, strip leaves from 1 sprig rosemary and throw them on top with lots of cracked black pepper and roast at 400 degrees F until the bacon is crisp, about 10 minutes.

Herbed Horseradish Mayonnaise: Stir together 1 cup mayonnaise, 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish, cup freshly minced herbs such as parsley, basil, chives or scallion, 2 tablespoons olive oil, a little squeeze of lemon juice, and salt and pepper.

Step 6

Serve the hamburgers in toasted buns with desired accompaniments






